- 7. If he thinks his clothes are not good enough, something is wrong with his pride. This excuse is over exalted, for the persons who use it can usually go anywhere else in the same town.

And when any of the above, excepting the first, are the reasons one will not regularly worship and study, something is wrong with the heart. Do not deceive yourself by thinking that everything will "work out alright" if everything is not all right with your heart - check yours.

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To Hell, In a Good Humor

We are surrounded by people who are lost in sin and destined to spend eternity in Hell. That is, of course, unless they can be reached with the saving power of the gospel (Romans 1:16).

There are, however, a number of issues making it harder and harder to reach lost people. For instance, our increasingly secular society has caused people to be much less interested in discussing religious topics. And, too, there is the difficulty caused by all the false teachers that are spreading their errors far and wide. We could also mention that the materialism of our prosperous times have blinded many to the realities of eternity.

But, one of the main problems we face is our own unwillingness to take the gospel to the lost. Too many Christians fear that others will be offended or 'put off' by any effort to share God's truth with them. And so, since they might not respond favorably to our work, we do nothing. How many Christians fail to speak up to warn their friends and neighbors because they don't want to hurt their feelings with the truth about their lost condition?

Are we really willing to let these folks 'go to Hell, in a good humor?' Wouldn't be better to risk a negative reaction now, instead of letting them be lost forever? Think!
